# YearInReview

## Well what a year!

Just a few short months ago we reached the pinnacle of our sport as we competed at the Olympic and Paralympic Games. What is for certain, Swimming is very much the heart and soul of Australia.

There is a sense of pride amongst the swimming community around our swimmers which is both wonderful and unique – and for us this culture is key.

Of course we are constantly striving to do better on the world stage and there have been many high performance lessons that have come from this year.

These will be invaluable as we head towards the Commonwealth Games in 2018 and Tokyo 2020.

**What an incredible 18 months. Stories that will soon become part of our history, our legacy left behind for the next generation.**

Stories from the Rio 2016 team; those that performed under pressure, those that were humble in defeat, and gracious in victory.

Stories from those new faces that entered the pool for the first time, inspired by the actions of our team. And those older as well, that perhaps returned after some time away, or put on their goggles and started their swimming journey as an adult.

We are all a part of the same swimming community but everyone's path is different. Our obligation is to inspire Australians to swim, be that for fun, fitness or competition.

A very special mention must go to Mrs Gina Rinehart, who has been a supporter of swimming from the beginning. We are delighted that Hancock Prospecting have extended their role as Principal Partner until 2020.

Mrs Rinehart is the Patron of our sport and her support through Hancock Prospecting and the Georgina Hope Foundation has been vital.

One of the milestone moments on our current journey came in August 2016 when we partnered with Optus, a company that shares our vision and excitement for the future of our sport!

Soon after, we launched Optus Junior Dolphins – our very first national junior program. Optus Junior Dolphins will be a breakthrough project and just the beginning of realising our vision.

The past year and a half has also seen further stability provided for our sport thanks to the signing of Network Seven as Broadcast Partner.

Seven will broadcast our major domestic and international events, including the 2018 Commonwealth Games on the Gold Coast and Tokyo 2020, bringing the sport of swimming to homes across the country.

**The support of all of our partners was felt by our team, halfway across the world as they competed at the Olympic and Paralympic Games in Rio.**

The Dolphins' energy and enthusiasm had to be seen to be believed.

The highlights for me? In the pool at the Olympic Games it was Mack Horton, Kyle Chalmers and our world record breaking women's 4x100m freestyle relay team. While in Open Water, Jarrod Poort's gutsy attempt to lead the race from start to finish, almost paid off with an unlikely medal.

As a whole our Olympians improved on their seventh position from four years ago in London, ranking number two in the world in Rio. And our young and dedicated Paralympic team proved they have the potential to continue to rise up the ranks.

My standouts? Teenagers, Maddie Elliott, Lakeisha Patterson, Tiffany Thomas Kane and Timothy Disken all making their way onto the podium in individual events in Rio. And the women's 34 point 4x100m freestyle relay, emulating the Olympic team, winning gold and also setting a new world record. Our Paralympic future is very bright.

**Not only that, but our athletes' behaviour, solidarity and sportsmanship was inspirational.**

For some, the past year was a lesson, a step on the way to bigger and better things into the future, for others lifelong goals were achieved and now new ones will be set. Regardless of the outcome, I know that every member of our team had their family and friends, coaches, staff, officials, volunteers and the swimming community, all behind them every step of the way.

While there have been many positives, 2016 saw the passing of one of the sport's greatest innovators, Forbes Carlile MBE, at 95-years-of-age.

Forbes lived an incredibly full life, husband to Ursula, an Olympic pentathlete, innovative Olympic swimming coach. Forbes will be dearly missed but the name Carlile will long live in the history of swimming throughout Australia and the world.

Something I will take away on a personal perspective was his desire to always improve, to innovate. This mantra is so critical for us as a sport, at every level, from grass roots to high performance.

Over the past year and a half there are many achievements to be celebrated, but I can assure you the desire to improve, to get better, beats strong here at Swimming Australia.

The challenge ahead is exciting. Together with the support of our swimming community and our partners the future is looking very bright!

Go Australia!



As we reflect on the past year and a half and our objective throughout this Olympic Cycle - to make Australia proud of the Australian Swim Team, I am enthused about just how far we have come.

This year was the peak for us, the biggest moment on our international swimming calendar and the way our people conducted themselves in victory and defeat was superb.

Our swimmers, on both the Olympic and Paralympic Games teams impressed in Rio.

In addition to our medal performances, our swimmers presented themselves as a united team and supported teammates and competitors through victory and defeat.

**It is a testament to their team culture and we are excited by the things that will come from these swimmers.**

Both are young teams. The lessons learnt will absolutely feed our hunger to make further progress and build from our strong foundation as we strive for excellence over 2017, through to the 2018 Gold Coast Commonwealth Games and 2020 Tokyo Olympics.

As we look back over the 18 months, we kicked off with the 2015 World Championships in Kazan where our team finished with three dual world champions in Bronte Campbell, Mitch Larkin and Emily Seebohm.

The IPC World Championships were conducted in Glasgow where teenagers Maddie Elliott and Tiffany Thomas Kane picked up world titles and set new world records in their respective events.

Back on home-soil and into 2016, the Hancock Prospecting Australian Swimming Championships, were an absolute highlight as Adelaide played host to the best swimmers from across the country as they raced for Olympic and Paralympic selection.

With our new broadcast partner Channel Seven on deck, we were thrust back into the limelight and based on all of the reports we received, the sport and the athletes were presented extremely well.

With legends like Dawn Fraser, Priya Cooper and Ian Thorpe poolside, their presence at the event reinforced the power of our sport and its history, and the value of linking the past and the present.

**Commercially this past year and a half has been huge for our sport, with a number of new sponsors joining swimming and crucial partnerships being extended well into the future.**

Swimming Australia Patron, Mrs Rinehart through Hancock Prospecting as Principal Partner and the Georgina Hope Foundation providing support to our swimmers, have remained the major supporter of swimming.

Mrs Rinehart has recently announced the extension of her partnership with swimming for a further four years. Her passion for our sport and swimmers is evident to all and greatly appreciated.

The transition to Channel Seven has had a tremendous impact on our sport and with the Olympic, Paralympic and Commonwealth Games Network partnering with Swimming until 2024, we have a broadcast partner that will ensure our sport has a place in the lounge rooms of houses across Australia on Prime Time TV.

It was fantastic to hear that audiences peaked at 1.5million on day 6 of the Hancock Prospecting Australian Swimming Championships and for five nights peaked over 1.2 million viewers. Simply superb exposure for our sport!

Leading telecommunications organisation Optus has also joined as a Principal Partner, signing on just prior to the Olympic Games. Together we share the goal of inspiring a million more Australians to swim. What an exciting opportunity this is. Support from our sponsors underpin every element of our organisation and ability to invest in growth opportunities.

A special mention must go to Speedo who have done such a wonderful job outfitting the Dolphins over many years. They produced Olympic and Paralympic swimwear that delighted our athletes and that each of them wore with pride, including the iconic gold cap which epitomises the Australian Swim team.

We thank our high performance partners, the Australian Sports Commission and the Australian Institute of Sport who have not only funded our sport, but have been partners in our delivery.

Similarly, to our State Institutes and Academies and the Australian Olympic Committee and the Australian Paralympic Committee - who managed the teams at the two pinnacle events - and the Australian Commonwealth Games Association we thank you for your support of our high performance programs.

To our other valued partners; Bio Island, COON Cheese, Sperry, 2XU, Milk and Co. and Accor we are also very grateful for your continued support of our sport.

At the grass roots level of our sport, which is so critical, we have just achieved a six-year high in memberships for 2015/16. An amazing result for our Participation and Sport Development team and our State Partners who together have delivered this result.

**In October 2016, Optus Junior Dolphins was launched at the iconic North Sydney Pool with the help of Rio Olympians Madison Wilson and Emma McKeon and swimming legend Ian Thorpe.**

Optus Junior Dolphins provides a fantastic example of how we are working as one sport. This program is the result of State Associations, ASCTA, sponsors as well as staff from across the various units of Swimming Australia coming together to help create the program. We want to build Optus Junior Dolphins in to one of Australian sport's iconic junior programs.

And finally and very importantly I would like to congratulate our President John Bertrand AO, the Swimming Australia Board, my management team and staff, coaches, athletes, officials and volunteers on

a magnificent 18 months - your hard work and dedication to the sport was evident throughout.

And to our partners in the States and Territories across Australia, the ASA and ASCTA our partnerships are strong and building further. We would not have achieved any of the above without the passion and commitment of the entire industry.

I would like to leave you all with a quote that I believe is relevant to our sport as we seek to build on a tremendous foundation that has been laid.

We have an opportunity for each of us involved in swimming, in whatever shape or form to apply this into our area of influence and to leave a lasting legacy and to inspire Australians to be the swimmer they want to be.

### MyLANE launched

MyLane allows members to access their own race results, PBs, qualifying times and compare against previous times, setting goals in the process.

MyLANE also allows members to pay for their membership, access upcoming meets and enter competitions. It also reduces the level of administration required by members and club administrators during membership renewal periods and competition entries and allows members to find all information related to their (or their family's) swimming in one spot.

### Beyond the Black Line

The Australian Swimmers' Association in partnership with Swimming Australia have created the Beyond the Black Line series that delves into the challenges faced by boys and girls as they grow up in the sport of swimming.

This will lead to better member experience, access to information and real-life lessons for girls and boys in what can be a challenging time of their lives.

Thanks to the Australian Government's Indigenous Advancement Strategy through the Prime Minister and cabinet.

### Indigenous Program

The program was recently extended into the APY Lands in South Australia. Extending the reach of our sport gives every Australian the opportunity to participate. Benefits: Improved water safety, health and well-being in the communities and trains community people in CPR, coaching and managing pool facilities.

### Inclusive Swimming Framework

This year Swimming Australia launched the Inclusive Swimming Framework - (ISF) 7 Pillars toolkit. This framework guides Swimming Australia, its stakeholders and aquatic partners towards achieving full inclusion of people from a diverse array of circumstances and backgrounds. It is knocking down barriers and encouraging a lifelong love of swimming for all.

### Coaching Framework

The new coaching framework provides a more contemporary and flexible means for providing coach education and learning. The new modules will incorporate more online learning and smaller modules. The framework proposes performance coaches receive a bespoke learning journey based on their interests and experience.

### Development Officers

Club Development Officers were appointed to support our grassroots. The Club Development Officers provide guidance, support and education to clubs to make volunteers' jobs easier.

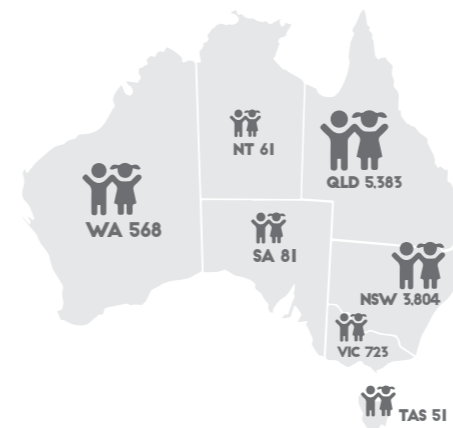


# GROWING THE SPORT FROM THE GRASSROOTS.

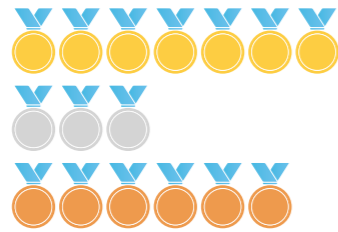

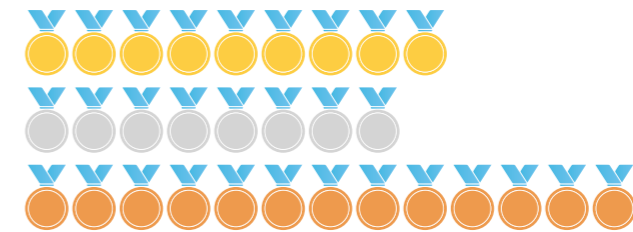

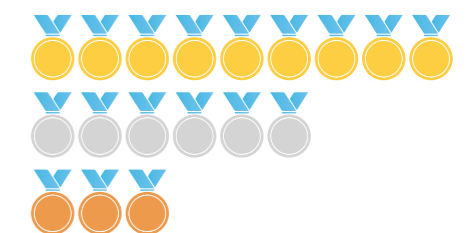

Cate Campbell was the first Australian to set an individual world record in the women's 100m freestyle since Jodie Henry in 2004, joining Fanny Durack, Dawn Fraser, Lorraine Crapp, Shane Gould, Libby Trickett and Jodie Henry in an exclusive Australian world record club.

Rachael Watson's gold medal winning swim at the Paralympic Games in the S4 50m freestyle made her the first Australian Paralympic swimmer classed S5 or below to win gold this millennium.

After winning gold in the 100m backstroke at the 2015 World Championships in Kazan, Mitch Larkin held both the long and short course world titles for that event.

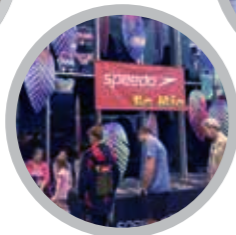

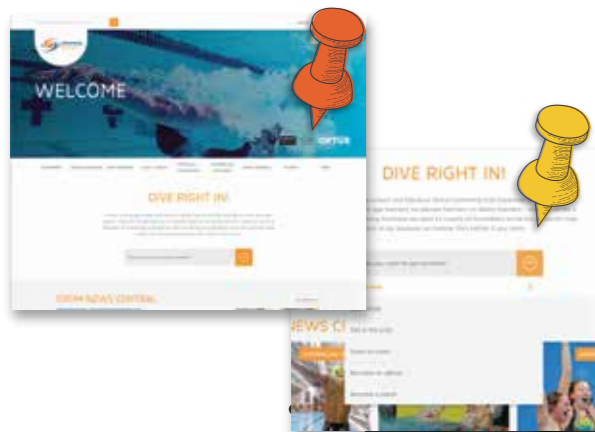
## NETWORK 7

## CONTENT DEVELOPMENT

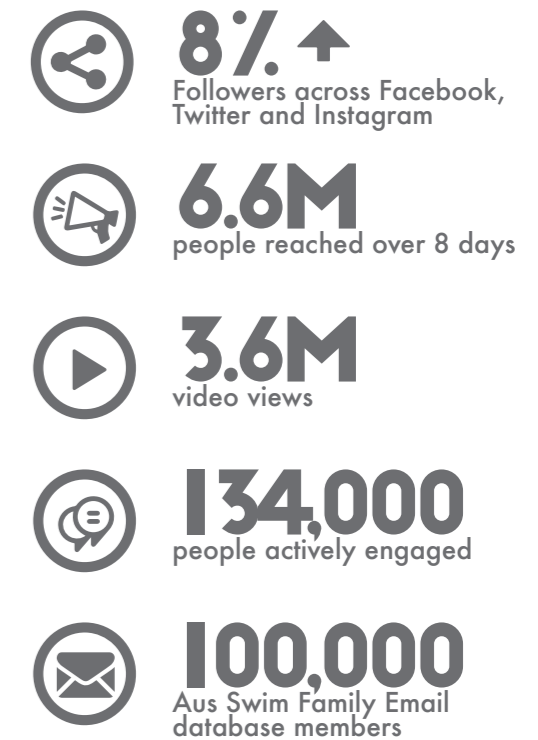

ELLIE COLE

Had Sarcoma as a child and was forced to undergo a leg amputation. Is one of Australia's greatest and most recognised Paralympians. A triple-Paralympian, Ellie has won multiple International gold medals and set new S9 world records. Won the Cosmopolitan Magazine Fun Fearless Female Award in November 2015.

Our female athletes are role models. They embrace their strength, power and speed and are a positive source of inspiration for many people all over the country and even the world. Australian swimming has a strong history of female swimmers from the first Australian female Olympic medallist Fanny Durack, to Dawn Fraser and Libby Trickett and now our current team members carry on this legacy.

JESSICA ASHWOOD

Suffers from severe scoliosis, won bronze at the 2015 World Championships in Kazan, Australian record holder and our top distance freestyler in the 400 and 800m freestyle events.

MADDIE ELLIOTT

## WELFARE AT THE FOREFRONT OF OUR SPORT

July marked the publication of Swimming's Safe Sport Framework – leading the way in Australian sport and ensuring a safe and enjoyable environment for all in swimming – particularly Children and Young People. The Safe Sport Framework transforms our previous Member and Child Welfare Policies and Codes of Conduct. It was developed over a 12 month period in consultation with the Australian Childhood Foundation, the Australian Sports Commission and our Member Associations.

The Safe Sport Framework sets new benchmarks of best practice behavioural standards in swimming, including a new Code of Conduct for dealing with Children and Young People. It will also form the basis for other sports to adopt similar frameworks.

The Framework provides guidance, advice and an exhaustive range of resources and tools to aid all members of the swimming community.

Interactive workshops have been conducted across the country, exploring how to prevent issues arising and how to respond to issues if they do arise.

# ACROSS THE COUNTRY.

## INDIGENOUS PROGRAM

There were a total of 13,209 Indigenous Program participants in 2015/16 in the Northern Territory and Northern Queensland. The program was recently extended into the APY Lands in South Australia.

Swimming NT is a driving force behind the Indigenous Program and is helping to extend the reach of our sport, giving every Australian the opportunity to participate. The benefits of the program include; improved water safety, health and well-being in the communities plus community people are trained in CPR, coaching and managing pool facilities.

## NATIONAL SWIMMING FRAMEWORK

Swimming QLD have played a significant role in the development of a new National Swimming Framework. To be launched in early 2017, the framework will be a valuable resource to all involved in swimming as a means of ensuring the best environment and support network exists for swimmers, at each step of their development.



## OPEN WATER SWIMMING

Swimming WA continue their focus on Open Water with more regional locations added to the calendar – Doddies Beach Mandurah, Town Beach Mandurah, Bunbury and Busselton.

## EVENT OF THE YEAR

With Adelaide the home of the 2016 Hancock Prospecting Australian Championships, Swimming SA were a big contributor to the success of the event. They supported the implementation of Club v Club Relays during every night of competition and sourced volunteer basket handlers and medal presenters. All the effort paid off with the event being awarded Event of the Year at the South Australian Sports Awards.



## JOIN A CLUB TV CAMPAIGN

Swimming Tasmania took their message to TV screens after securing free airtime on WinTV. The advert promoted participation, encouraging club sign-up.

## LAUNCH OF SWIMMATE

Swimming NSW developed SwimMate, a swimming results app specifically for NSW club members. The app will provide results as well as a host of other features free to members. The app is the first of its kind in Australia and plans are being developed to make it available in other states.



## ONLINE TECHNICAL OFFICIAL TRAINING

Swimming NSW launched four online Technical Official Training Courses to assist volunteers with gaining accreditation. To date, well over 500 volunteers have complete course online.

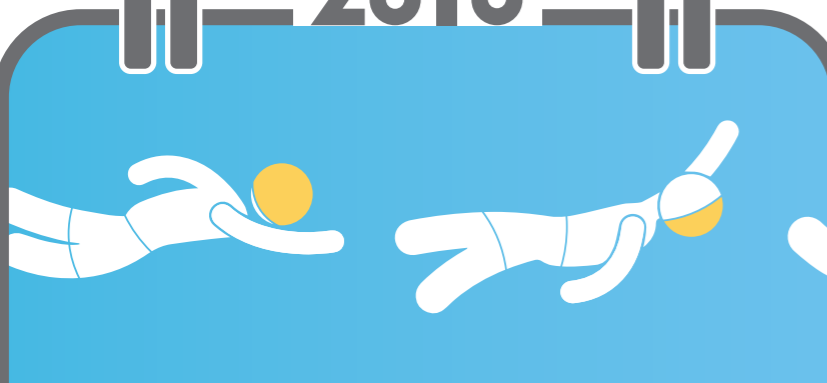
## GETTING ADULTS IN THE WATER
